2002 Hottenstein Reunion to be held on July 27th and 28th

The 66th Annual Hottenstein Reunion will be held on Saturday, July 27, and Sunday, July 28, 2002 in Lancaster County, PA, in the Lancaster – East Petersburg area.

Sunday will be the traditional reunion and picnic; Saturday will feature optional tours and a dinner event.

Our Sunday picnic will be held at the home of Wayne and Vera Hottenstein, near East Petersburg, just northwest of Lancaster. Events, including tours and a dinner, are planned for those arriving on Saturday. Tour options include: a tour of the State Capitol Building in Harrisburg, a tour of Indian Echo Caverns near Hershey, and/or a tour of the Lancaster Amish area, including the historic Central Market in Lancaster. These tours will be based on persons indicating their interest on the reservation form. Saturday evening, we will have dinner at the Olde Greenfield Inn, near Lancaster. Directions to the Reunion Picnic, at the home of Wayne and Vera Hottenstein, 1790 State Road, Manheim (near East Petersburg) (Phone 717/898-7794) are as follows:

Wayne and Vera Hottenstein's home is located just East of East Petersburg on Route 722. East Petersburg is North, Northeast of Lancaster.

From points South and East, travel to the intersection of I-283 and Route 72. Follow Route 72 North (the Manheim Pike) for about 1.8 miles to the center of East Petersburg; this is the intersection with State Road or Route 722. Turn left onto State Road (Route 722). Continue 0.8 mile. 1790 State Road will be on the right.

From points North and West (from Harrisburg), travel to the intersection of I-283 and Route 722 (State Road). Travel Northeast on State Road for 0.4 mile. 1790 State Road will be on the left, beyond South Colebrook Road.

Joe and Joyce Hottenstein assisted many with lodging accommodations last year. In doing this, they very kindly contributed the travel agent's commission to the Hottenstein Reunion. This initiative is most appreciated and helpful to us in defraying our Reunion expenses.

Directions to the Country Inn and Suites are as follows:

From points in all directions, travel to the intersection of I-283 and Route 72. Follow Route 72 North (the Manheim Pike) for about 1.8 miles to the center of East Petersburg; continue North on Route 72, into Manheim, to the Country Inn and Suites. (Route 72 Northwest bound is sequentially Manheim Pike, North Main Street, and Lancaster Road; from I-283, the distance to the Country Inn and Suites is about 5.0 miles.)

Bed and Breakfast

Lodging is also available at two beautiful Bed and Breakfast homes near the Reunion location. Prices vary by the number of persons. One can accommodate up to 7 persons. One is actually on a farm with a Hottenstein history.

Because of the varied accommodations, Joe and Joyce Hottenstein ask that all who are interested in B&B accommodations to contact them as above. They will assist in assuring that needs and accommodations are matched.

The William Hottenstein Family History in Second Printing, Orders Continuing

The second printing of this extensive history of the descendents of William Hottenstein, second generation continues. Arrangements have been made with the bindery for the assembly of additional books as ordered. The delivered orders now total 41 books. We have an additional 15 casings and printed page sets available for binding. However, we must make the orders in a minimum of six.

Currently, there are four orders pending. Upon the receipt of two additional orders, the books can be completed.

The book, replicated in its original format, contains a personalization page bound into the book, which can be formatted for gift or family orientation. Orders may be made on the attached reservation form or initiated at the Reunion on July 28th. Orders received by August 20th will be the basis for the additional wave to be assembled by the bindery. Due to the printing and binding expense, only those orders for books received will be prepared. The cost of the book, which is \$80, includes shipping.

The Olde Greenfield Inn (717/393-0668) is located at 595 Greenfield Road, in Lancaster.

From West on I-283 (which becomes Route US30) or East on Route US30 (just East of Lancaster), take the Greenfield Road Exit. Merge onto Greenfield Road, Northeast bound and travel for 0.5 mile to the Olde Greenfield Inn. [Travel time from the Country Inn, in Manheim, to the Olde Country Inn is about 25 minutes.]

For those staying at the Country Inn and Suites and wishing to travel as a group, the group will depart from the Country Inn at 6:30 PM. If joining the group from the Country Inn, please meet in the lobby area.

Grandfather and Grandson Graduate Together

Harold Leroy Phillips has attended the Milton Area High School (PA) graduations of his four daughters and of four grandchildren. However, the graduation this year was very special. The 75-year-old has received his own Milton High School diploma more than five decades after his classmates received theirs. His grandson, Philip Martin Herman, who is a member of the Class of 2002, received his diploma at the same time.

Harold Phillips, New Columbia, Union County, Pennsylvania, was awarded a diploma through a special program in which people who left high school before graduation to serve in World War II, the Korean conflict or Vietnam are eligible to graduate. The Milton school board approved the granting of his diploma in April. Phillips quit school in December of his junior year to join the Navy, where he served with the Seabees in Okinawa.

Philip Herman presented his grandfather with his diploma after he received his diploma. Phillip Herman, who is close to his "Pap," said "It's pretty cool" that they graduated together. Eighteen-year-old Herman played football and was in track for two years; he is an Eagle Scout. They will join a number of Milton graduates in the family. Phillips' daughters are Milton graduates. With Philip, he will have five grandchildren who have graduated from Milton. The daughters are Carolyn Herman of New Columbia, PA, who is Phillip's mother, Cynthia Lindner of Columbus, NJ, Connie Aucker of New
