### **The Hottenstein Mansion**

The Hottenstein Mansion was built in 1783 by David and Catherine Hottenstein, David is the fifth child of Jacob Hottenstein, the immigrant, who originally purchased the tract of land from the Penns.

The home remained in the Hottenstein Family until it was received by the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County in 1976 as a gift from Dr. David Fulmer and Mary DeTurk Hottenstein, who had purchased the Mansion in 1965.

Constructed of limestone, it is an outstanding example of Georgian style architecture as seen through the eyes of local Germanic builders. It features exquisite original mantels and paneling, corner cupboards, hand wrought hardware, and an unusual pair of datestones. One room, the grand room on the second floor, has been removed to the Henry Francis DuPont Winterthur Museum, near Wilmington.

### **Contributions to the Historic Trust To Be Directed to Mansion Projects**

Restoration projects at the Hottenstein Mansion need funding. Our program will include descriptions of projects underway and planned to bring the Mansion back to its historic grandeur. The article introducing Dr. Reynolds, on the last page of this newsletter, explains Dr. Reynolds interest -- his dream -- in preserving and restoring the Mansion.

As an initiative of the Reunion, special procedures are established for contributions from Hottenstein family members to be directed to Mansion projects. Checks are to be separately payable to the "Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County" and may be sent with the reservation form included with this newsletter, whether or not attending the Reunion. Contributions to the "Trust" are tax deductible and will be separately acknowledged.

### **Big Development Threatens Mansion, Russel Hottenstein, Reunion, Opposes**

A big box development proposal for land adjacent to the Mansion raised issues on sight-lines, traffic, lighting, and the environment. Russ Hottenstein, on behalf of the Reunion, provided testimony at the public hearing in September 2006. While the proposal was approved, the approval conditions were determined by the developer to be too costly. The development project has been withdrawn.

More proposal information and the opposition efforts will be explained at the Reunion.

## 2006 Hottenstein Family Reunion Meeting Minutes July 18, 2006, Watsonstown, Pennsylvania

The reunion began with a prayer offered by Betty Hall followed by a catered lunch. The business meeting was called to order at 2:40 P. M. by the president Terry Schnure. Comments were made in reference to the delicious meal that was served followed by introductions of those present. There were 45 family members in attendance.

**Old Business:** Joyce Hottenstein presented the finished Hottenstein reunion family quilt which was worked on by many family members and recently finished by Vera Hottenstein and Joyce's family.

**New Business:** The President described that he has been in contact with some new suppliers of memorabilia and that there are prints, coffee mugs and tiles available emblazoned with the Hottenstein coat of arms.

Russel Hottenstein reported that he has been in contact with Professor Reynolds who resides in the Hottenstein Mansion in Maxatawny Township outside Kutztown, Pa. Professor Reynolds has extended an invitation to hold the 2007 reunion on the grounds of the Hottenstein Mansion. Professor Reynolds is the Freyberger Professor of German culture at Kutztown University. After a discussion the members present agreed to take Professor Reynolds invitation and set the last weekend in July as the date for the 2007 reunion. It was also reported that professor Reynolds is actively pursuing the restoration of the mansion and out buildings. The Mansion is presently listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Professor Reynolds has enlisted consultants to apply for a nomination as a National Historic Landmark which would put it in the same status as Mount Vernon or Monticello.

Russel also explained that he had attended some Maxatawny Township Supervisors meetings that were being held to gather public input regarding an application by a large commercial developer to develop an adjacent 140 acre farm. The proposed plan would significantly change the neighborhood and at least one consultant has advised that it could affect further historical status for the mansion. A concern has also been raised that future plans by the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation to expand Rte. 222 could affect the mansion which is presently separated from the highway by a narrow shoulder. As a local resident, Russel said he would continue to attend the meetings and asked the members present if he would be authorized to speak on behalf of the reunion committee to support Professor Reynolds efforts should the opportunity arise. A motion was made and seconded to authorize Russel to represent the interests of the Hottenstien Reunion committee at the Maxatawny Township hearings.

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## Tiles and Mugs, New Hottenstein Memorabilia

Tiles and mugs with the Coat of Arms were introduced at the 2006 Reunion, in celebration of the 70<sup>th</sup> Hottenstein Reunion. The Coat of Arms is reproduced on ceramic or porcelain for long lasting use.

The tiles are ceramic, 6"x6" in format, and are available in either a glossy or matte finish. Each tile is individually fired, using a hand applied image transfer process. Being glazed, the image is fixed forever. The tile may be used as a trivet for hot or cold dishes or alternatively be used a wall hanging. The price is \$18.00 each.

The mugs are porcelain and will contain 14 fl oz. As with the tile, each mug is individually fired using a hand applied image transfer process. This mug with the Hottenstein Coat of Arms is suitable for many uses, in addition to coffee times. The price is \$19.00 each. For ordering, an order form for both the tiles and mugs is included on the reverse of the Hottenstein Reunion Information form, which is enclosed with this mailing.

## “Dreams Do Come True”

The following is excerpted from the Lehigh Alumni Bulletin, Spring 2005. It is an introduction to **Robert Webster Reynolds, Ph.D.** He is the curator of the Pennsylvania Cultural Heritage Center, in Kutztown. Dr. Reynolds too is the curator of the 1873 David Hottenstein Mansion; it is also his home, with his family. Copies of the complete article will be available at the 2007 Reunion are available upon request by contacting Terry Schnure.

Dr. Reynolds is the Freyberger Professor of Pennsylvania German Culture at Kutztown University, a responsibility that also includes roles as curator of the [Pennsylvania Cultural Heritage Center](#) in Kutztown.

A native New Englander whose own heritage goes back to the 1630 Puritan migration to Massachusetts, Reynolds developed his fascination with Pennsylvania German culture while studying preservation as an undergraduate at Gettysburg College. He then got his master's degree at the University of Vermont and went on to study history at Lehigh, a decision that ultimately led to his "dream job."

"Dreams do come true -- this is the best job I've ever had in my life," says Reynolds, as he walks through the hallways of the farmhouse at the Cultural Heritage Center, which also includes a one-room schoolhouse, the bank barn, library, and other outbuildings. "I spent a lot of years sitting in jobs I didn't like; now, I love getting up and going to work."

The job does seem like it was custom-made for Reynolds, who got his Ph.D. in history from Lehigh in 2003 and has extensive hands-on experience in restoration architecture (for example, he was lead carpenter on the Thomas Edison house in New Jersey).

Part of his time will be spent educating the public about Pennsylvania German culture, part will be spent teaching a class at Kutztown on the history and architecture of the Pennsylvania German landscape, and in his "free" time he will laboriously scrape paint from the windowsills of the Hottenstein Mansion as he restores the million-dollar house to its original glory.

Reynolds' responsibility as a preserver of Pennsylvania German Culture is essential because untouched historical sites -- such as the barn at the Heritage Center, which is still full of farm equipment, and the 19th-century country doctor's office at the mansion, which still houses the tools and medicines (like opium and ether) exactly as they were left by the physician who once used them -- are scarce these days.

Reynolds says his education at Lehigh taught him to teach himself, a vital skill for his current role. "From the beginning, my professors made

me responsible for my own program. It fostered in me the ability to walk into a situation like this where there are a lot of things I know and also a lot of things I need to learn, and figure out how to get that knowledge -- how to be a scholar.

At Lehigh, I learned that nothing is impossible.

You can figure anything out if you work hard enough." Hard work is precisely what it will take to restore the Hottenstein Mansion." But for Reynolds, it will be a labor of love. And his students at Kutztown will participate in and benefit from the restoration.

"As part of the class, students are assigned to the outbuildings at the mansion," he says. "They are going to sift through the artifacts, study the buildings, look at the conservation needs, and then restore the structures."

Reynolds spoke up and took on the restoration project when he got wind that the Trust for History Preservation of Berks County was thinking of selling the home. Reynolds and his wife stepped in and offered to restore the property in return for the life rights to it.

This is a dream for my wife and me -- to have a mansion. The Hottenstein Mansion is a national historic landmark. In its day, it was a true mansion -- Dr. Hottenstein and his wife lived a genteel lifestyle here. I'm not proposing I'll be furnishing it with all 18th-century antiques and recreating exactly what it looked like originally. I'm not a millionaire, and that's what it takes to do that these days. It's more that I'm going to live in it, care for it, and then work carefully over time to bring it back."
